**Border-to-Border Trail (Bandemer Park to North Hydro Park)**

The Border-to-Border (B2B) Trail from Ypsilanti to Rawsonville was completed in 2020. This entire 17.5-mile section of the B2B Trail follows the flow of the Huron River as you explore several parks, historic sites and natural areas along the way.

Soak up the scenery as you ride through the river valley. We recommend starting your journey at Bandemer Park and following the path all the way to North Hydro Park and back. As you head south along Argo Pond, you'll pass by the Ann Arbor Rowing Club boathouse and cross over Argo Dam. Here you'll find the Argo Livery and Argo Cascades, where you can rent kayaks or tubes and play in a series of man-made rapids or paddle to Gallup Park.

East of the Dixboro Dam, a trail loop winds through Parker Mill County Park where you can visit a historic, operable grist mill. Where the paved trail ends at Cornell Road, you will need to navigate around the campus of Eastern Michigan University and through a residential area on sidewalks and sidestreets to Frog Island Park (east side of the

Huron River on Forest Avenue). The paved trail resumes at Frog Island Park and continues to North Hydro Park. You'll find a nice picnic area and restrooms at North Hydro Park, making it a good place to relax before your ride back. Throughout the trail route, especially around Eastern Michigan University, pay close attention to the small "B2B" directional signs to make sure you stay on the designated route.

**Huron River Water Trail**

The 104 miles of Huron River Water Trail from Proud Lake to Lake Erie is recognized as a National Water Trail with easy access and beautiful scenery along its entire route. Of the 17 miles of river shown on this map, the 3.5-mile section between the Argo and Gallup Liveries is a pleasant 1.5-hour paddle — and quite likely the most popular stretch of water trail in all of Michigan.
